

# DEAR COMRADES IN THE ANTI-WAR

BRIGADES, Our little project to end the war from the boondocks in Oregon officially got Off the ground today. Operation "Christmas in the trenches" WILL be sending Holiday packages to about 100 National Guardsman in Oregon, with handwritten letters about groups like Military Families Speak Out, Iraq Veterans Against The War; tell them about the cuts in veterans pay, healthcare, and benefits; express the greatest concern for their safety and their long awaited arrival home. We'll be sending lightweight sweet treats in the packages for the holidays, to remind them of home.

WHAT WE REALLY NEED IS ABOUT 20 PEOPLE TO WRITE 5 LETTERS EACH TO THE SOLDIERS, MAKE THEM FEEL APPRECIATED AND LOVED, AND THEN DIRECT THEM TO WEBSITES FROM VETS AND MILITARY FAMILIES OPPOSED TO THE WAR.

We have the materials to put the packages together,

we have 5 letter writers and some money (the packages total price including postage will be \$5-6 each).

We have the names and addresses of 100 Oregon National Guardsman. Deadline to get these all in the mail in time for Xmas is Dec. 10. So a couple hours of your time and a few dollars, and a few people could start a revolution. Maybe.

If you want to be involved in a great project with some really FUN people, here are the talking points for writing letters. Choose any or all of them, and make them personal, from you.

Talking points (not in any order)

- 1. Stress your Oregon connection with the soldier you write to.
- 2. It should be handwritten.
- 3. Seek common ground. Sports, family, pets, vacations are good topics
- 4. Stress that we support the troops, we want to bring them home, and we want to end the war now.
- 5. We admire what courage it takes to put your life on the line for what you believe in.
- 6. We'll miss them for Christmas and the holidays, but here's a little piece of the USA (the sweets).
- 7. we're really concerned about the loss of veteran's benefits, healthcare and pay.
- 8. We're really concerned about the "stop-loss" orders that are keeping a lot of soldiers for many more months away from home.
- 9. If you want to get a little creative and personalize the package more, take a digital picture of you with your significant other and family pet, print it on your home printer, and write holiday greetings on it.
- 10. Self-disclosure. Tell them something personal about your life, your family, your home. Be utterly sincere.
- 11. Direct them to websites like veterans against Iraq war, military families speak out, and the like (information provided).

# HELP SPEED THE CHECKOUT LINES

While waiting in line to check out, you can help speed the process up by offering to help pack the current customer's groceries.

Politely ask the person if you can help pack their groceries. While they are unloading and reading prices off to the cashiers, you'll be packing them up, and speeding the process along. The other folks in line will be happy to move your groceries along and keep your place in line.

I've done this on several occasions, and it has helped. Some people will not want assistance, so please be respectful.

On a similar topic, I've been proposing a one-line cashiering system for the last several years. This system, which you can see in action at Jerry's hardware store, speeds up the flow of people checking out. As cashiers come on or off shift, there is no hustling to shift lines, and there is no slowdown if you get caught behind someone with a very large load.

One of the resistance points has been that it is very difficult to assemble volunteers for work parties at Growers. Implementing this system will require some re-design of the produce area, the current cash registers, and some electrical work.

If 6 people will identify themselves and become available for a 1 hour planning session and a 8 hour construction session (over a weekend, either in December or January), it will give added momentum to the project.
